Nathan Strong Elk, Jr., is a Southern Ute Tribal member, a Director at Large/Native American member of the Old Spanish Trails Association, Southern Ute Native American Church member, and a board member of the Southern Ute Housing Association. His belief is in working for the land and Earth and the people that he serves and considers himself a passionate, loving and forgiving Leader. Nathan started the afternoon with an opening prayer. He then presented a Ute perspective on the Old Spanish Trail as well as a Native American flute performance.

John Carson teaches history at Otero Junior College in La Junta, Colorado. His father was Jess Carson, who lived from 1914 to 1999 and was the son of Charles Carson, who lived from 1861 to 1939 and was one of Kit Carson's seven children. John Carson, a park ranger and interpreter at Bent's Old Fort National Historic site in La Junta, was recently honored as one of eight Top Frontline Tourism Workers statewide. John was both engaging and personable and gave a lively talk about Kit Carson and the Old Spanish Trail.

Joseph Sanchez is the Director of the Spanish Colonial Research Center in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Dr. Sanchez worked on the study to evaluate the feasibility and eligibility of designating the OST as a National Historic Trail under the feasibility study provisions of the National trails system act. Dr. Sanchez gave an interesting historical perspective of the Old Spanish Trail, discussing the first documented use of the name and the various routes of the trail used by trappers, traders, immigrants, and military expeditions.
